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



10 US Code 8680: Restrictions on Overhaul and Repair of US Vessels in Foreign Shipyards

- 10 US Code 8680 is US law that limits the ability for US Naval vessels to conduct ship repair overhauls in foreign shipyards.
- Exceptions include:
 - Voyage Repair periods for maintenance and repair required to sustain operational capability
 - US Navy Littoral Combat Ships (LCS) operating on deployment
 - US Navy vessels home ported outside of the US and Guam
 - MSC vessels deployed outside of the US and Guam for two or more years
 - Presently 32 MSC vessels are exempted from the 10 USC 8680 restrictions and accomplish all of their planned M&R in foreign shipyards:
 - 6 T-EPF Expeditionary Fast Transports
 - 1 HST High Speed Transport
 - 7 T-AKE Dry Cargo/Ammunition
 - 1 T-AGM Missile Range Instrumentation
 - 5 T-AGOS Ocean Survellance
 - 5 T-AGS Oceanographic Survey
 - 1 T-ATF Fleet Ocean Tug
 - 1 T-ARS Rescue and Salvage
 - 5 T-AO Fleet Replenishment Oiler



Partner Opportunities:


